Maria Georgina Fernandez Sesma is a professor in the major of English Language Teaching (ELT) at the Sonora State University in Mexico. Doctor of Philosophy in applied linguistics from the University of Southampton (England). She has a master's degree in pedagogy with an emphasis in linguistics from the Autonomous University of Baja California in Mexico. Fernandez is responsible for the Research Group in the major of ELT. She has academic publications on critical thinking development, adult students' oral production, English for specific purposes, and didactic material elaboration. Currently, her research focuses on language learning with technology in the tertiary context.



Karla Reyes Arias is a full-time teacher in a public elementary school in Mexico, where she teaches English as a foreign language. In addition, she works for the National English Program (PRONI). Reyes has an undergraduate degree in English Language Teaching from the Sonora State University in northern Mexico.
